Learning from Young Adults in Prison

- SU engagement contested; practically non-existent for young people in the justice system (Beresford & Carr 2012)
- How can we genuinely engage the voice and experience of the most excluded young people in a way that is meaningful for BOTH them and the students?

- Co-ordinating student group
- Operating within a custodial setting / expect the unexpected
- Managing student group's anxieties
- The nature of young men's lives, uncomfortable beginnings
- Contracting



The Journey

- Planning daily structure with flexibility within this
- Process as important as outcome
- Planning 'bite size' chunks
- Allowing lots of 'down time', time to get to know one another and chat
- Having fun
- Allowing project experience to take its course




